Why Should Audiologists Obtain the Pediatric Audiology Specialty Certification?

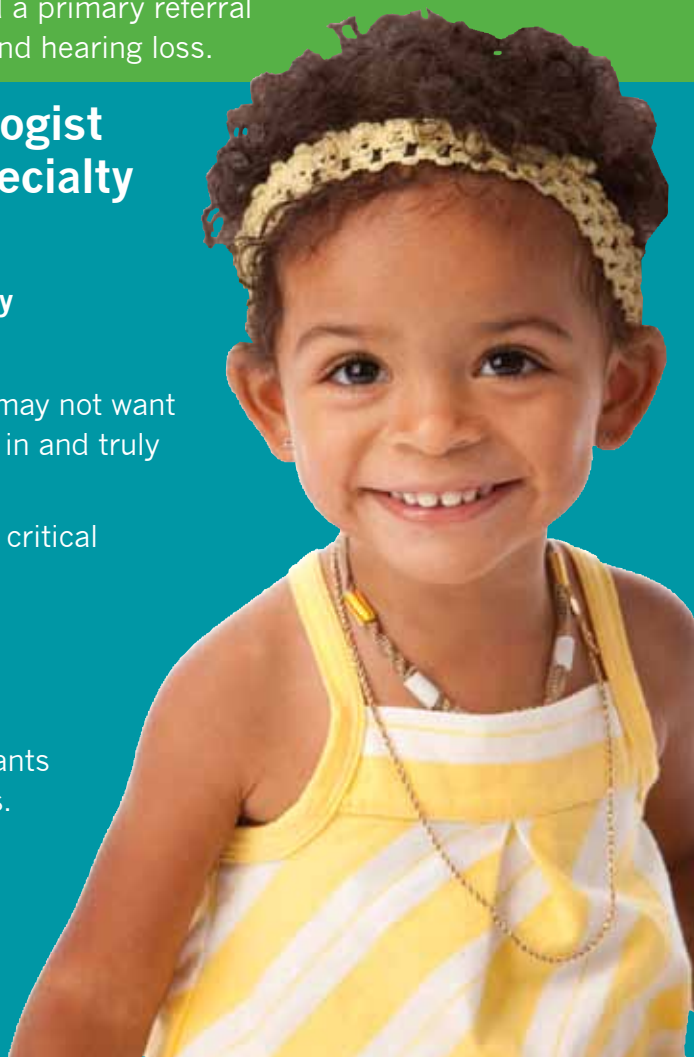
Audiologists holding the ABA's Pediatric Audiology Specialty Certification (PASC)...
